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Teaching notes

Introduction

The Drawn to the Word series of colouring book CDs aims to explore the Old Testament, New Testament and the Word of Mary through eyecatching, accessible and child-friendly illustrations. The images appeal to children and can be used in RE lessons, whole class prayer, group prayer and individual prayer with school children or with children's liturgy groups. The images inspire children to create their own illustrations in response to passages from scripture or events during the liturgical year. Alternatively they can be simply used for mindful colouring where the children meditate on the Word of God as they colour the image. Drawn to the Word is designed to give children a sense of prayerful peace as they reflect on what God is telling them through the pages of the Bible, through the life of His Son Jesus and through the life of Mary.

All the resources have been tried and tested with primary school children and children's liturgy groups.

Using the program

You can use *Drawn to the Word* by dipping in and out of it at certain points during the liturgical year, or perhaps to explore the Sunday's Gospel reading in more depth in a child-friendly way.

You may want to focus on a certain book of the Bible, or a part of Jesus' or Mary's life that is linked to the RE topic that you are covering in class or in your liturgy session.

When you have chosen which piece of scripture

you would like to focus on, set the scene with the children by reading the scripture together, if you have Bibles to hand, they could locate the passage for themselves.

Next talk around the text, asking the children; 'What is happening here?' 'What is God saying to us through the passage of scripture, or through the life of Jesus, or the life of Mary' Listen to the children's ideas, then ask them the very personal question, which they don't have to answer out loud – 'What is God saying to you in your heart?'

The children then decorate the illustration using ink, paint, coloured pencils, felt tips or crayons. It's a good idea to play some quiet music while they are colouring and light a candle to remind them that Jesus is with us.

Encourage them to take their time and tell them that this is a way to pray, that they can reflect and meditate on the Word of God while they are colouring.

Some children like to create their own artwork inspired by the images or by the Scripture itself. There is no right or wrong way to do this. The important thing is that the children become familiar with the Word of God and they take the time to listen to God speaking to them through His Words in Scripture and His Words as He speaks to them in their hearts in this time of peaceful prayerful reflection.

I hope you experience as much enjoyment with your children as I have creating this resource for you.

Preface

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Dear Reader,
